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

IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

G.K. Chesterton famously said 'the Christian ideal has not been tried and found wanting. It has been found difficult; and left untried'. It's relatively easy to talk about or give lip-service to ideal such as loving our enemy, not judging, turning the other cheek, and praying for those who mistreat us.

But try doing these things when you actually have someone to forgive or indeed have an enemy who wants to harm you. It's not as easy, is it?

So, what's the solution? Do we have to try harder, pull our socks up, regroup and buckle down to the Sermon on the Mount and the Beatitudes? For many this is the answer and their best response. The big problem - apart from being heretical - is that it misses the mark, because our faith isn't about trying harder and putting in the effort.

Of course, many will claim it is, and without a doubt we have to co-operate, to want to live Jesus' teaching, but simply trying harder isn't the answer. Grace is the answer, grace building on nature, so that we can live a new life in and by the power of the Holy Spirit.

How does this happen? As offensive and scandalous as this may sound, we need to be overwhelmed by our complete inability to live the Christian ethic; we need to touch our bankruptcy and feel deep down in our being a wretchedness born of an insight that we desperately need God's grace. Nevertheless, we don't need to be dismayed or overwhelmed, for the Holy Spirit's power enables us to live holy lives, because holiness is the fruit of the Spirit.

We often believe that God helps those who help themselves, but actually God helps precisely those who cannot help themselves. When we acknowledge this, when we recognize our need for God's grace, his grace, mercy and Holy Spirit are poured out into our hearts, so that we can love our enemy, forgive from our hearts, and pray for those who persecute and mistreat us.

Lord, I'm a poor sinner, but you can work the miracle of making me a better person.


Ministries

Welcome to all our parishioners and visitors to the Sunday Celebration of our liturgy.

In today's Gospel Jesus gave an important sermon on these essential virtues and elements that must guide our lives and actions as Christians. It's about justice. How do we reconcile our constant quest for justice with the virtues of mercy and compassion? Today we speak about mercy and at the same time advocate justice. We have a clue in the second weekday preface of the Eucharistic prayer. It says 'in justice God condemned us, in mercy he redeemed us'.

Justice and mercy can be mutually exclusive, contrary to what our society has asked us to believe. If we are hurt and find it does not heal so fast. In fact it can last a long time. Jesus knew this perfectly well. Jesus not only spoke on this but lived it. Paul reminds us that we derived our body and way of life from Adam. We derived the spirit that gives life to our body from Christ. Whatever our situation or circumstances, we must not lose the sense of the sacred. We must guard against sin. When we do sin, we seek God's mercy. Lord be merciful to us and show us your kindness.

Lent begins on 2 March. We have been asked to walk 5k a day in solidarity with 200 million children who are at risk of malnutrition around the world. By accepting this challenge and walking this Lent you can help give hunger it's marching orders. Each small step we can make Big Things Happen. Use the QR Code on the leaflet that you will find in the Narthex. We also ask you to make a big sacrifice in the second collection on the weekend of 12/13March. This is putting our Christian action into practice. However, if walking is not your cup of tea, you can raise funds with a hot cross bun! Perfect for a coffee morning after Sunday Mass during Lent on Saturday evening/Sunday morning. We need tea and coffee helpers. The offer of a cup of coffee or tea when people come to Mass is a simple but important form of welcome and hospitality. Don't be in a hurry to go home. Come and linger with one another and get to know your fellow parishioners. If you can help, please sign up in the Narthex. Please see other parts of our newsletter to see how you can help in our parish family. We ask you also to encourage one another to return in person to our Sunday Mass especially our young people. Our relationship with Jesus is so precious in our world and in your life. He loves you so much. Our church is open all day as Jesus awaits your visit. St Paul says 'I have never stopped thanking God for you. I remember you in my prayers.....I ask that your minds may be opened to see His light, so that you will know what is the hope to which He has called you, how rich are the wonderful blessings He promises His people, and how very great is His power at work within us who believe'. Finance News

Eddie has very kindly prepared a financial forecast for the income and expenditure of the parish through to end March 2022. This forecast predicts the parish will be over £22,000 in debt by the end of this financial year - March 2022. There is some mandatory, and expensive, work that has to be completed due to Health & Safety repairs, which will total in excess of £16,000.

THE BLIND MAN OF JERICHO.

This is the reading that will be discussed at the Synodal Meeting.

They reach Jericho, and as he left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the Son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me'. And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me'. Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here'. So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up, he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go, your faith has saved you'. And immediately his sight returned, and he followed him along the road.

QR Codes


What are they and how do they work?

A QR (Quick Response) code works in the same way as a barcode at the supermarket. It is a machine-scannable image that can instantly be read using a Smartphone camera. Every QR code consists of a number of black squares and dots which represent certain pieces of information. In our instance, the QR code will take you directly to a website where you can make your donation digitally, instead of using cash. The Diocese is wanting ALL churches to use this form of giving to replace cash which is time consuming and expensive to count and check.

Using the QR code enables the parish to save time and money – both of which are very welcome! So please don't forget that if you normally donate cash weekly, then please use the QR codes which can be found on the back page of the newsletter each week. This helps to keep the money coming in while reducing the amount of cash that we have to count, double check and then take to the bank. And amazingly some banks have actually stopped taking cash! *Thank you and God Bless*.
