



So he said to them, "Cast the net over the right side of the boat and you will find something." So they cast it, and were not able to pull it in because of the number of fish.".

IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

We know that God cares for us, body and soul. By death the soul is separated from the body, but our hope is that they will be reunited on the last day. Jesus' resurrection revealed the nature of this new body, a risen body, infused with God's light and life, and not prone to sin or death.

John's Gospel records some deeply personal and intimate moments in Jesus' life, such as when he wept at Lazarus' death (John 11:35) or when he invited his disciples to 'Come and have breakfast' (v.12) after cooking fish for them. The breakfast story leads into a fascinating exchange between Jesus and Peter, in which Peter is asked three times to feed the Lord's sheep (vv.15-17). This meant that as the Rock, Peter must ensure that believers are fed with the nourishment of Christ. We see this in Peter's First Letter: 'Like newborn babies crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation, now that you have tasted that the Lord is good'(2:2-3 NIV).

One way we can literally feed off this pure spiritual milk is by prayerfully studying and meditating on Peter's two letters. When we do this, we draw directly from the original rock on which the Church was built, the pure well of our salvation. If we don't eat (feed), we grow weak and unhealthy. This is also true in our spiritual lives and the staple diet from which we feed is: prayer, the Scriptures, the Church's teaching (the Magisterium) and Lectio Divina (spiritual reading).

Supremely we are fed by the Eucharist and the Sacraments, food for our soul and food which is good for this life and the next. We don't live in a parched land: God has given us rich sources of spiritual food, and a banquet of teaching and spiritual life has been prepared for us. Just as with our physical bodies, eating on the run isn't ideal: we must carve out time and space with the Lord where we can be nourished by him.

Lord, we praise and thank you for the table from which we feed - the Word of God, the tradition of the Church, and the source and summit of our faith, the holy Eucharist.

Welcome to our parish of St. Joseph the Worker to all our parish family.

Easter is a celebration of resurrection and an opportunity to reflect on the power of new life. Sometimes we assume we understand the mystery of death and resurrection. Until a child says to you 'What is the meaning of death?' or 'Where did grandma go after her death'. Or where is heaven?

In simple terms rising from the dead is like waking up from sleep. We simply point to the skies as the place of heaven.

Conversely we point to the ground, to explain that hell is the depth of the earth. However, for an adult, deeper explanation is required.

A true picture of heaven and hell is as a state of relationship or exclusion from God. Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus who assures all who believe in him that they would experience the process of dying and rising. Jesus told his disciples 'I am the resurrection and the life: he who believes in me, though he was dead, yet he will live'. 'And whoever lives and believes in me shall never die'. This is an expression of faith, to believe in the resurrection of the body and in the life to come. At Easter Sunday we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ; we anticipate our resurrection: we celebrate the grace of rising from our many falls; we celebrate our rising from sickness to good health; we also celebrate our rising from despair to a blessed hope. St. John Paul II advises us 'Do not abandon yourselves to despair. We are Easter people and hallelujah is our song.' Have a blessed week.

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First Holy Communion Day



Our children will be making their first Holy Communion on Saturday 14 May at 11.00 a.m. We have all participated recently in the Easter Triduum on the day of the Last Supper, the priest consecrates the bread and wine and by the power of the Holy Spirit, they are totally changed into the substance of the Body and Blood of Christ. This change is called transubstantiation. In this change the crucified and risen Lord is truly present to his church and he calls us to share in his divine life. In Holy Communion, it is nothing less than Christ's Body & Blood, Soul, and Divinity that we receive. We are drawn into communion with God, the All Holly One. We live in the life of the Blessed Trinity.

This is an awesome moment in the life of your child. A life that you as parents have the responsibility to nurture and enter into the very life of Jesus Christ – food for the soul as he or she journeys to Eternal life. As parents and as a community we must set the example of attending Sunday Mass. This must be for each one of us a priority in our lives. Please pray for our children and parents and all of us that this may be, so Christ promises us that "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him (Jn 6:54,56). The mass is the source of true freedom and witness.

WALSINGHAM PILGRIMAGE

As you will be aware from the information Fr. Daniel Kelly has already sent out, we are also keen to encourage families to take part in the diocesan pilgrimage to Walsingham on Saturday 28 May. We have tried to identify things that will make the day easier for parents with young children and help them and their children get as much out of the day as possible. Plans include setting aside a room at the shrine for the use of families during the day, and designating a time when families can visit the slipper Chapel without fear of disturbing the prayer of others, when there will also be a family rosary led by one of the Community of Our Lady of Walsingham. We will also be producing a special liturgy and activity booklet for the children. If in the past parents have expressed any concerns about coming to Walsingham with the diocese it would be useful to know what these concerns are so that we can try and address them.

QR Codes

What are they and how do they work?

A QR (Quick Response) code works in the same way as a barcode at the supermarket. It is a machine-scannable image that can instantly be read using a Smartphone camera. Every QR code consists of a number of black squares and dots which represent certain pieces of information. In our instance, the QR code will take you directly to a website where you can make your donation digitally, instead of using cash. The Diocese is wanting ALL churches to use this form of giving to replace cash which is time consuming and expensive to count and check.

Using the QR code enables the parish to save time and money - both of which are very welcome! So please don't forget that if you normally donate cash weekly, then please use the QR codes which can be found on the back page of the newsletter each week. This helps to keep the money coming in while reducing the amount of cash that we have to count, double check and then take to the bank. And amazingly some banks have actually stopped taking cash!
