### IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

Disasters and tragedies have a way of focusing our minds and grabbing our attention. Think of how the collapse of the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center in New York on 11 September 2001 focused the entire world's attention.

There is, for sure, a morbid streak in human nature, a voyeuristic tendency to dwell on the misfortune of others in a way that is neither healthy nor helpful. Seasoned traffic officers, for example, complain bitterly of the phenomenon of 'rubbernecking', when traffic slows down as motorists gawp at the aftermath of a crash scene, despite knowing full well that tailbacks and congestion will follow.

In the ancient world tragedies and disasters were construed as a sign of God's displeasure or anger because of sin. The Book of Job captures this well when Eliphaz, one of Job's advisers, chimes in with great earnestness, 'Consider now: who being innocent has ever perished? Where were the upright ever destroyed? As I have observed, those who plough evil and those who sow trouble reap it.' (4:7-8 NIV).

This view is, however, not restricted to the ancient world. It emerged very much in the aftermath of 9/11 and expresses a way of thinking about God and the world which is wrong and distorted. Jesus strongly refuted the idea that those who fall victim to tragic events were especially sinful and taught that we all need to approach life with a repentant and contrite heart. The truth is that evil and terrible things happen to both good and bad people.

Furthermore, those who choose to live a righteous life often have to endure all manner of contempt and suffering, whereas the unrighteous are embraced by the world and enjoy its rewards. This is, without a doubt, one of the mysteries of life. We need to have a deep understanding of repentance as well as a deep grasp of God's forgiveness and mercy. Rooted and anchored in this knowledge we must learn to move through life praying with all our heart, 'Lord, have mercy on me a sinner.'



Welcome to all our parish family and to our visitors this weekend.

I wish to draw your attention that our newsletter is printed a week in advance. For example, today, 7 March, we will be preparing the newsletter for the weekend of 19/20 March. Therefore, if you wish your Mass intentions to be printed in the newsletter they will have to be given to me in advance. Secondly Mass intentions for the weekend are usually booked up well in advance but they can be said during the week. However many people get upset because they can't be present during the week. I am sorry for that but there is nothing I can do. Whether you are present or not Mass will be

offered for whatever you have requested. I as your parish priest have to say a Mass every weekend for my parishioners. It is an obligation I have to keep. We only have two Masses as our Mass attendance is low. Now that restrictions have been lifted, we need you to return to our Sunday Holy Mass unless you are housebound or suffering from an illness. If you can go on holiday or freely go out for a meal, then I feel you should certainly put God first and foremost in your lives.

The catechism of the Catholic Church says 'The liturgy is the summit towards which the activity of the church is directed; it is also the font from which all her power flows.. (1074) The liturgy is also a participation in Christ's own prayer addressed to the Father in the Holy Spirit (1073). The whole liturgical life of the church revolves around the Eucharistic sacrifice and the sacraments (1113). The catechism goes on to say 'The church celebrates the sacraments as a priestly community structured by the baptismal priesthood and the priesthood of the ordained ministers' (1132).

We look forward to welcoming more of our parishioners back to our parish family in the

In today's readings we are reminded that Lent is a very important time especially in our first reading of the call of Moses. On one occasion God reminded Moses that the ground he was standing on was 'Holy ground'. We need to remember that we are always walking on Holy ground, because God is everywhere. If God is one with his people, He is also one with all the people in the world. We must take our world seriously. Jesus said 'You must love one another as I have loved you'.

During Lent we must revise one thing within our understanding of our own faith. Faith is based on wonder. Faith is based on awe. The Gospel warns us to make the best use of time. We are each a fig tree planted by the Lord. He gardens us, He nurtures us, He cares for us with Word Sacraments and the grace to seek His presence in others. We are living God's time, not our time. How well are we using this time? That is the challenge of The Gospel today. It also reminds us time is short. We must make the best use of our time now today. Remember the fig tree was given another year. Our time could be this Lent.

May God give us the courage to use his time wisely. May we bear fruit. Every blessing on you all.



### **QR Codes**


### What are they and how do they work?

A QR (Quick Response) code works in the same way as a barcode at the supermarket. It is a machine-scannable image that can instantly be read using a Smartphone camera. Every QR code consists of a number of black squares and dots which represent certain pieces of information. In our instance, the QR code will take you directly to a website where you can make your donation digitally, instead of using cash. The Diocese is wanting ALL churches to use this form of giving to replace cash which is time consuming and expensive to count and check.

Using the QR code enables the parish to save time and money – both of which are very welcome! So please don't forget that if you normally donate cash weekly, then please use the QR codes which can be found on the back page of the newsletter each week. This helps to keep the money coming in while reducing the amount of cash that we have to count, double check and then take to the bank. And amazingly some banks have actually stopped taking cash! *Thank you and God Bless*.
